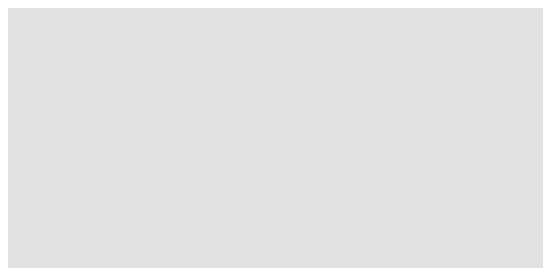
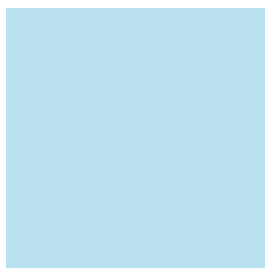
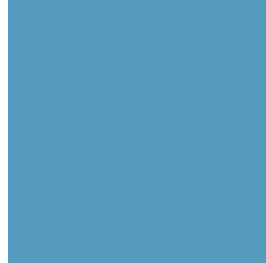
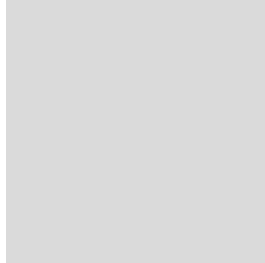
Beyond the library walls

Throughout the year, DHCLS hosts hundreds of exciting programs attended by thousands of children, teens, and adults. We have storytimes to help toddlers and preschoolers develop early literacy skills. Our Summer Reading Program encourages children and their favorite grown-ups to read in between school years. We even host classes and workshops to help people of all ages pursue personal goals, professional development, and lifelong learning. We also know how to have some fun, with trivia nights, a murder mystery theater, and even a coloring club for adults.

Some of our most impactful programs go beyond the library's walls and throughout our community. For example, through a partnership with the Selma Elementary School Bright Key Program, the library's Youth Services staff visit classrooms and facilitate STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics) activities. Through these monthly visits, students gain hands-on experience with computers, coding, robotics, three-dimensional drawing, and other 21st-century skills.

The Summer Reading Program is a cornerstone of our efforts to support literacy and learning. During the summer months, we host activities that will get kids excited about books and about reading and that inspire them to be imaginative and curious. The summer of 2022, with the theme “Oceans of Possibilities,” was no exception. We had magicians, balloon artists, animals, story times, and craft activities. In short, the library was anything but boring.

Just as important, research shows that serious learning happens when kids read for fun during the summer. In fact, children who don’t read in between school years can lose up to three months of their reading skills, and it can take weeks during the following school year to catch up. Through the proven effectiveness of summer reading, public libraries positively impact school-age children and help ensure the success of students when they return to the classroom.

And the Summer Reading Program isn’t just for kids! It’s important for children of all ages to have “reading role models” – so we encourage parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, and neighbors to join in the fun.

More than just a good time

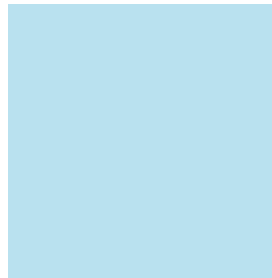

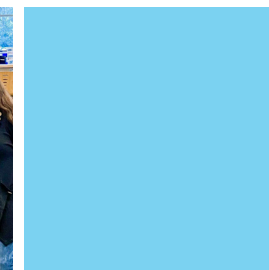
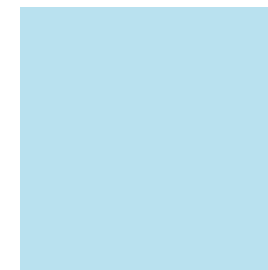

GRANTS & GIFTS

FY 2022



Davis Malone, CEO and President of MidSouth Bank, via the Ashford Downtown Redevelopment Authority

- ▶ The donation of the former MidSouth Bank IT Data Center, located at 301 5th Avenue, for the purpose of renovating the facility as the new Ashford Library.

Alabama Public Library Service

- ▶ An \$87,175 American Recovery Plan Act (ARPA) grant for the purpose of replacing desktops, monitors, and other essential technology.
- ▶ A \$45,000 Library Service and Technology Act (LSTA) grant for the purchase and installation of hardware for Wi-Fi in the Park, which will provide public wireless internet access across all 200+ acres of Westgate Park. (Project implementation anticipated for late 2022/early 2023.)
- ▶ In-kind support as a participant in the Reimagining School Readiness initiative, which provided training for Youth Service staff and resources for parents and caregivers to help their children develop early literacy skills.

Friends of the Library

- ▶ \$42,000 to support a variety of library improvements, initiatives, programs, resources, and services.

Covington Memorial Foundation

- ▶ A \$38,000 gift for library collections and early literacy programming throughout the year.

Daniel Foundation of Alabama

- ▶ \$25,000 for the installation of the INDEX, an interactive exhibit space at the Main Library. (Construction is slated to begin in late 2022 and should be completed in early 2023.)

Wiregrass Electric Cooperative

- ▶ A \$9,500 Operation Round-Up Grant for the replacement of HVAC components at the Main Library.

Alabama Humanities Alliance

- ▶ A \$5,000 Alabama Humanities Recovery Grant to support library marketing activities.

Wiregrass Resource Conservation & Development (RC&D) Council

- ▶ A \$3,000 Education Grant for the library's Junior Naturalist Program for teens.

Alabama Tourism Department

- ▶ A \$2,600 grant to support a literary keynote and to promote the value of DHCLS programs, resources, and services.

Catherine P. Howard Trust

- ▶ \$1,137 for educational materials and children's collections.

Digital Lift

- ▶ A \$1,000 grant to offset costs associated with implementing new software for human resources management and payroll.
